


ISRD's Operational Focus:

In Ganjam district, ISRD operates across all 22 blocks, prioritizing Children, Women, Scheduled Tribes, Scheduled Castes, Fisherfolk, and Other Backward Communities. The

organization focuses on peace and justice, education, health, livelihoods, climate action, coastal development, and disaster management to strengthen community resilience against climate-induced challenges and ensure long-term well-being. With strategically located field offices in Gajabadi and Ramannapatnam, ISRD ensures effective implementation and widespread outreach throughout the district.

2. Gajapati District:

In Gajapati district, ISRD operates across all 7 blocks, focusing on Children, Women, Scheduled Tribes, Scheduled Castes, and Other Backward Communities. The organization's initiatives encompass peace and justice, education, health, livelihoods, climate action, disaster management, and biodiversity conservation, all aimed at strengthening community resilience against climate-induced challenges and promoting long-term well-being. With strategically located field offices at the headquarters in Paralakhemundi and Gangabada, ISRD ensures effective program implementation and outreach throughout the district.

3. Nabarangpur District:

In Nabarangpur district, ISRD actively works across all 10 blocks, with a strong emphasis on empowering Children, Women, Scheduled Tribes, Scheduled Castes, and Other Backward Communities. The organization undertakes initiatives in peace and justice, education, health, livelihoods, climate action, and disaster management, aiming to build resilient communities capable of addressing climate-induced challenges and achieving sustainable well-being. With its field offices strategically located at the district headquarters in Nabarangpur and Dabugam, ISRD ensures comprehensive outreach and effective program delivery across the district.



CHILDLINE Project Overview:

ISRD has been instrumental in operating two Childline centers in Ganjam and Gajapati districts, along with a Railway Child Help Desk at Brahmapur Railway Station. This initiative is part of a national, 24-hour emergency helpline dedicated to supporting marginalized children in need of care and protection. Through various intervention services, the project is committed to creating a region free from child abuse, exploitation, trafficking, and violence, aiming to rescue and restore abandoned and orphaned children.



Key Components:

- **Resource Directory:** ISRD developed a comprehensive Resource Directory, which spans from grassroots to district levels. This directory contains essential information on relevant departments, service institutions, and accountable functionaries. The database enables quick and responsive services to children in need, with a remarkable 15-minute response time.
- CHILD WATCH Program: Initiated as early as 2006, the CHILD WATCH Program serves as a foundational tool for tracking and identifying vulnerable children and their families. This application helps ISRD not only to respond effectively but also to plan for the long-term protection, development, and sustainability of at-risk children.
- **Highway Campaigning:** To extend outreach, ISRD has implemented Highway Campaigning—a unique strategy to sensitize communities in villages adjacent to highways. This includes installing Childline information boards and forming village committees to support child protection efforts. The initiative broadens awareness and ensures local support for the cause.

Achievements and Impact:

Every year, thousands of children benefit directly from ISRD's CHILDLINE initiatives. The project concluded in August 2023, with innovative changes in concept, content, and design. These efforts have significantly contributed to the safety, recovery, and empowerment of children across the regions served.

Conclusion:

The CHILDLINE Project marked a significant milestone in child protection within Ganjam, Gajapati, and surrounding areas, achieving notable success in rescuing and supporting

vulnerable children. Although the project ended in August 2023, its legacy continues through the lasting structures and awareness it established. ISRD's strategic initiatives—such as the CHILD WATCH Program and Highway Campaigning—leave a lasting impact on the communities, reinforcing the mission to create safer environments for children.

ISRD Childline Achievements in Gajapati and Ganjam Districts:

Our advocacy and networking initiatives operate at multiple levels, engaging with local self-governance and collaborating with officials at both the district and state levels. The strategies for effective implementation include:

- Sensitization and motivation efforts to raise awareness within communities
- ❖ A community mobilization process to foster active participation
- ❖ Institutional building to create sustainable support systems
- Capacity development for stakeholders to enhance their effectiveness
- ❖ Participatory planning that involves the community in decision-making
- Strengthening village, cluster, and slum children's clubs to empower youth
- Collective action to address child protection issues collaboratively
- Involvement of Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs) in initiatives
- ❖ Gender integration to ensure equal protection and support for all children
- ❖ Enhancing vocational skills at residential schools and Bal Ashrams
- Promoting development through convergence with relevant line departments.

ISRD is proud to present the impactful outcomes of our Childline initiatives in both Gajapati and Ganjam districts. This past year, we focused on multiple areas to support vulnerable children, including medical assistance, shelter, family restoration, protection from abuse, sponsorship, parental support, missing children's cases, emotional guidance, and long-term rehabilitation. Our partnerships with local institutions and community organizations have been essential in enhancing the safety, well-being, and development of these children.

Medical Help:

- Gajapati District: Through medical aid agreements with hospitals and on-site first aid services, 272 children received prompt medical assistance, improving their health, and reducing risks.
- Ganjam District: ISRD collaborated with local hospitals to provide rapid response and referrals, enabling 169 children to access timely medical support, promoting faster recovery and positive health outcomes.

Shelter Support:

- Gajapati District: Partnerships with local shelters and child welfare facilities helped secure emergency accommodations for 128 children, offering them safety and stability.
- Ganjam District: ISRD's shelter initiatives provided safe housing for 58 children, reducing their immediate vulnerability, and ensuring a protective environment.

Restoration Services:

- Gajapati District: ISRD coordinated with Child Welfare Committees (CWCs) and families, successfully reuniting 472 children with their families or placing them in safe homes, fostering a sense of community and family stability.
- Ganjam District: By partnering with family tracing and welfare organizations, ISRD reunited 35 children with their families, reducing institutional dependency and enhancing family stability.

Protection from Abuse:

- Gajapati District: ISRD's CHILD WATCH program, legal aid partnerships, and community awareness sessions led to the protection of 316 children from abuse, significantly reducing exploitation and harm.
- Ganjam District: With strong reporting and response protocols and volunteer training, ISRD addressed 214 abuse cases, reinforcing child safety across the district.

Sponsorship and Financial Assistance:

- Gajapati District: ISRD connected 15 children with donors for educational support and necessities, fostering personal growth and stability.
- Ganjam District: Through initiatives like Ashirbad Yojana, 6 children received sponsorship support, aiding in their education and overall well-being.

Parental Support:

- Gajapati District: Our helpline for parental support served 546 parents, providing them with resources and counselling to strengthen family care and support.
- Ganjam District: ISRD's counselling and support hotline resolved 288 cases, improving family ties, and offering essential support for child welfare.

Missing Children Cases:

- Gajapati District: ISRD's collaboration with police and child protection units enabled the resolution of 9 missing children's cases, facilitating reunification with their families and enhancing child safety.
- Ganjam District: A rapid response team and alert mechanisms resulted in the successful reunion of 1 missing child with their family, preventing prolonged separation.

Emotional Support and Guidance:

- Gajapati District: Trauma-informed care and counselling sessions provided emotional support to 2,129 children, significantly improving their mental health and resilience.
- Ganjam District: Through counselling services and a dedicated helpline, 856 children received psychological support, contributing to their emotional well-being and stability.
- Other Interventions
- Gajapati District: ISRD addressed 841 additional cases, meeting a variety of needs, and improving the welfare of vulnerable children through school enrolments and welfare schemes.
- Ganjam District: Tailored response plans helped address 383 diverse cases, effectively supporting children with unique challenges and needs.

Rehabilitation (Ashirbad Yojana):

- Gajapati District: Long-term rehabilitation through the Ashirbad Yojana enrolled 152 children, offering them continued support for sustained development and stability.
- Ganjam District: ISRD's rehabilitation initiatives under Ashirbad Yojana benefited 45 children, promoting long-term security and holistic growth.

Awareness Programs conducted in two Districts:

ISRD's Childline Awareness Campaigns reached key locations across Ganjam and Gajapati districts, promoting child safety and awareness.

Bus Stops:

Engaged 1,568 individuals, raising awareness, and addressing cases of child protection.

Shelters:

Sensitized 475 children on Childline services, promoting safety.

Cinema Halls:

Reached 493 individuals, spreading awareness during screenings.

Parks:

Provided information to 268 families and children, fostering a community safety net.

Tourist Places:

Educated 374 individuals, including locals and visitors, on Childline's role.

Religious Places:

Sensitized 1,138 individuals, encouraging child safety reporting.

Schools:

Trained 1,273 teachers and students, creating a safer learning environment.

Slums:

Mainstreamed 239 children from labor, educating them on Childline services.

Other Public Places:

Reached 2,251 individuals, promoting awareness in community hotspots.

Railway Child Help Desk - Brahmapur Railway Station, Ganjam District:

The Railway Child Help Desk at Brahmapur Railway Station is a key component of child protection under the East Coast Railway, supported by the Ministry of Women & Child Development, Government of India. The program addresses urgent needs of children in vulnerable situations, including missing, runaway, trafficked children, child laborers, and those from urban slums or in challenging circumstances.

Outreach and Awareness Programs:

Railway Station: 1,423 individuals sensitized through case interventions.

Shelter Homes: 53 children informed about Childline services and safe environments.

Parks: 298 members of the public reached with awareness programs.

Religious Places: 742 individuals engaged in public awareness and case intervention

activities.

Schools: 946 teachers and students sensitized and informed about intervention cases.

Slums: 389 cases of child labor mainstreamed with targeted interventions.

Other Locations: 614 individuals engaged in public awareness and interventions.

District CHILDLINE - Gajapati District (Rural):

The District CHILDLINE in Gajapati District provides crucial support to children facing difficult circumstances, including medical aid, shelter, protection from abuse, and restoration services. This program, under the Ashirbad Yojana, collaborates with various community sectors to offer sustained support to vulnerable children in rural settings. Summary of Interventions (2023-24):

Outreach and Awareness Programs:

- Railway Station: 1,530 individuals sensitized through direct case interventions.
- Bus Stops: 9,843 members of the public reached with awareness programs and case interventions.
- Shelter Homes: 136 children educated about Childline services and safe environments.
- Cinema Halls: 294 members of the public sensitized through awareness interventions.
- Parks: 439 individuals engaged in public awareness programs.
- Tourist Places: 645 people reached with public awareness and case intervention activities.
- Religious Places: 1,834 individuals engaged in public awareness and case intervention.
- Schools: 842 teachers and students sensitized with intervention cases.
- Slums: 398 cases of child labor mainstreamed with targeted interventions.
- Other Locations: 1,178 individuals reached with public awareness and interventions.

Workshop on "VOICE of Children":

Held on 14th November 2022 in Brahmapur, the workshop engaged 869 children from 12 schools and slums, covering sanitation, hygiene, child rights, and child labor.

Bal Shakti Panchayat:

This initiative promotes child-rights-focused model villages, ensuring school enrollment and eliminating child labor, impacting 52,000 people across 12 Gram Panchayats.

Child Watch Program:

Launched in 2006, it tracks vulnerable children and supports the National Highway Campaign to protect children, benefiting thousands annually.

Campaign Against Violence on Children (CAVC):

Aimed at eliminating child abuse, this campaign supports Odisha's goal of being child-labor-free by 2025, improving school infrastructure and activating child protection task forces.

Combating Child Trafficking:

ISRD's 5-Step Intervention Mechanism combats child trafficking, with VCPCs and Children's Clubs supporting the Yellow Ribbon Campaign to prevent abuse.

Sensitization of Child Peer Groups:

ISRD promotes child participation through events, exposure visits, and awareness campaigns.

Bal Ashram:

Established in 1996, Bal Ashram provides education and vocational training to over 1,685 children, offering holistic care for their academic and personal development.

One Stop Centre ...

One Stop Centre (OSC) is a dedicated initiative aimed at providing integrated support and services to women and adolescent girls who are survivors of

Concept of One Stop Centre (OSC): The

adolescent girls who are survivors of violence, abuse, and exploitation. The OSC serves as a comprehensive, safe space where individuals in distress can access emergency medical care, legal assistance, counseling services, and temporary shelter under one roof. The primary objective of the OSC is to empower survivors by offering a range of



services that help them rebuild their lives, address immediate needs, and support their long-term recovery.

ISRD has been successfully implementing the One Stop Centre initiative across Ganjam, Gajapati, and Nabarangpur districts since 31st July 2018, and continues to provide these vital services to distressed women and adolescent girls to date. The OSC under ISRD's implementation has played a significant role in ensuring that survivors receive multi-dimensional support for their immediate and long-term needs. Like. i.e.,

Emergency Services and Shelter: The OSC provides 24/7 emergency support, offering safe shelter to women and girls who face domestic violence, sexual assault, trafficking, or any form of gender-based violence. Survivors receive medical care, psychosocial counseling, and legal guidance in their journey towards healing.

Legal and Medical Assistance: Legal experts



assist survivors in filing police

reports, obtaining protective orders, and navigating the legal system. Additionally, survivors receive medical checkups and treatment, which is essential for both immediate care and long-term recovery.



Psychosocial Support and Counseling: Recognizing the importance of mental health, the OSC provides individual and group counseling sessions to help survivors cope with the emotional and psychological effects of violence. The aim is to help them rebuild their self-esteem and confidence, and prepare them for reintegration into society.

Empowerment and Skill Development: The OSC ensures that women and girls are not just protected but are also equipped with skills for economic independence. ISRD provides vocational training programs in areas like tailoring, handicrafts, and computer literacy, empowering survivors to achieve financial autonomy.

Collaboration with Local Authorities and Stakeholders: ISRD works in close coordination

with local government bodies, law enforcement agencies, healthcare providers, and NGOs to ensure a collaborative approach to victim support. This helps in creating a robust safety net for survivors, ensuring that their needs are addressed holistically.

Through its continued presence in Ganjam, Gajapati, and Nabarangpur, ISRD has been able to reach out to numerous women and girls, offering them a lifeline in their time of need. Since its inception, the One Stop Centre has been a beacon of hope, providing life-saving services and ongoing support, with a




strong focus on empowerment and restoring dignity to survivors of violence.

For over 25 years, ISRD's Swadhar Home in Dabugam, Nabarangpur, has provided vital support to vulnerable women. In 2023-24, the home served beneficiaries across seven categories, including survivors of cruelty, marital issues, and trafficking, referred by district authorities and PRI members. Residents received nutritional aid, counseling, and legal support, along with vocational training in skills like tailoring, mushroom cultivation, and handicrafts to promote economic independence. Recreational and stress-relief activities, including yoga, cultural programs, and educational visits, fostered a supportive community, helping residents regain confidence and stability.

The ISRD Swadhar Home (Jagrti -II) in Dabugam, Nabarangpur, has remained a crucial support center for distressed women, offering a safe environment and resources for rehabilitation, skill-building, and personal empowerment. The following sections summarize key activities, services, and outcomes for the year 2023-24.

Key Activities:

- Awareness Generation: Engaged 1,167 women in sessions focused on rights, safety, and resources.
- Behavioral Training: Supported 132 women with skills to foster personal growth and resilience.
- Vocational & Skill Training: Trained 61 women in income-generating skills to encourage financial independence.
- Counseling Services: Provided individual counseling for 74 women and remote support through 233 telephone sessions.

- Legal Aid: Offered legal guidance and assistance to 12 women to address specific legal issues.
- Temporary Shelter: Provided safe accommodation to 67 women facing a range of challenges, such as abuse, mental health concerns, family disputes, and social exclusion.



UJJAWALA Program (Combating Human Trafficking) Jagruti - I

The Indian Society for Rural Development (ISRD), based in Brahmapur, Odisha, received the "JEWEL of INDIA Award - 2017" for its efforts in combating human trafficking and protecting child rights. Since 1994, ISRD has been instrumental in rescuing trafficked children and women and preventing trafficking in Odisha.

Key Activities of UJJAWALA:

A. Prevention Activities:

Community Vigilance Groups: These groups monitor and protect vulnerable children, meeting regularly to discuss issues like trafficking and child labor.

Balika/Balak Sanghas: Groups formed to promote child rights, celebrating important days such as National Girl Child Day and World Child Labour Day.

Awareness Campaigns: Street plays and educational materials are used to raise awareness about human trafficking and child rights.

B. Rescue Action:

In 2022-23, ISRD, in collaboration with law enforcement, rescued 22 young girls trafficked for prostitution. These girls were found at Brahmapur Railway Station and were being sent to Kerala.

C. Rehabilitation:

Rescued children are provided counselling, placed in schools, and supported in reintegration into society. ISRD also trains local youth groups to prevent trafficking in the district.

D. Reintegration:

Children and their families receive counselling on the dangers of trafficking. Parents are educated about legal protections, and commitments are made to prevent future trafficking. Health Ventures for the Elderly.

Awareness on Cancer and Health Camp Screening Test

On 21st October 2024, We, with the support of GEMS, Srikakulam, organized a Cancer Awareness and Health Screening Camp to promote early detection, prevention, and treatment of cancer and other health conditions.

The program aimed to educate communities, particularly vulnerable populations, about cancer risks, symptoms, and the importance of regular screenings. The camp provided **free medical consultations and screening tests**, focusing on **breast, cervical, and oral cancer**, along with general health check-ups, blood pressure monitoring, diabetes screening, and anemia detection.

Healthcare professionals and experts conducted awareness sessions to dispel myths, encourage early diagnosis, and inform participants about available healthcare services. Special attention was given to **women**, **elderly individuals**, **and marginalized groups** with limited healthcare access.

This initiative strengthened health-seeking behavior and facilitated **linkages with medical institutions** for further diagnosis and treatment, ensuring long-term healthcare support for the community.





Mobile Medicare Unit for the Elderly

Mobile Medicare Unit (MMU) for the Elderly reaches out to senior citizens in rural and isolated areas, providing them with accessible healthcare services right at their doorstep. This initiative includes regular health check-ups, diagnosis, treatment, and distribution of essential medicines tailored to the specific health concerns of elderly beneficiaries. Staffed with trained healthcare professionals, the MMU also promotes health awareness, preventive care, and early detection of age-related illnesses. Through this service, ISRD strives to improve the quality of life and health security for elderly individuals who lack access to conventional healthcare facilities, affirming ISRD's commitment to holistic, inclusive community welfare.

Cardiovascular Diseases:

- 5 patients treated through screening for risk factors like cholesterol and creatine kinase.
- ** 17 patients referred for further care.
- Chronic Respiratory Diseases:
- 59 patients treated with screenings for COPD and asthma.
- 78 patients referred for additional pulmonary function tests.
- Diabetes:
- 254 patients received screening, including blood and urine sugar tests and HbA1C checks.
- 343 patients referred for further treatment.
- Risk Factors (Lifestyle Diseases):
- 57 patients treated for risk factors like tobacco use, alcohol consumption, and stress, including liver profile and lipid tests.
- ** 118 patients referred for additional assessments.
- General Outpatient Care:
- 176 patients treated for common ailments such as fever and body aches, with general examinations and haematology tests.
- 312 patients referred for more extensive care.
- Communicable Diseases:
- * 78 patients treated with early detection and prevention for malaria, typhoid, and diarrheal diseases.

** 124 patients referred for further diagnostic tests.



ISRD operates dedicated Physiotherapy Clinics in Parlakhemundi, Gajapati district, and Similiguda, Koraput district, Odisha, to meet the rehabilitative needs of local communities. Staffed by a skilled physiotherapy team, the clinics provide personalized assessments and tailored physiotherapy interventions aimed at enhancing patient mobility, managing pain, and promoting overall physical health. With careful planning and expertise, ISRD ensures the delivery of high-quality, accessible care from the outset, making a positive impact on the well-being of individuals in these regions. This initiative aligns with ISRD's commitment to providing essential health services to underserved communities.

- Low Back Pain: 89 patients

- Spondylitis: 194 patients
- Ligament Injury: 7 patients
- Hip Osteoarthritis: 22 patients

Skill Development Program

In 2023-24, ISRD continued its Skill Development Program, aimed at improving women's livelihoods and income through enterprises, marketing, and value chain initiatives driven by Women Self-Help Groups (SHGs). Following a cluster approach, the program reached 32 acres across 2-3 patches within the Ranajhali and Gangadohani Gram Panchayats of Purushotampur Block, Ganjam District, Odisha, impacting 82 households.

The program promotes an integrated approach within these clusters, encompassing agriculture and horticulture, improved agronomic practices, crop diversification, intercropping, soil health management, community-managed seed systems, and vegetable cultivation for nutrition security. Peer-led "farmer-to-farmer" learning is central to its strategy.

The ISRD Skill Development Centres, located in Jodamba, Gajapati District, and Jaganathapur, Ganjam District, extend training to marginalized communities, particularly non-literate, neo-literate, and school dropouts aged 15-45. Priority is given to women, SC, ST, minorities, and other marginalized groups. During 2023-24, the centres trained 103 participants in informal and non-formal education, vocational skills, and personality

development. Training was also provided in trades like tailoring, computer applications, mobile repair, and electrical work.

Key Elements of ISRD's Approach:

Community-Centred Development:

- Emphasis on participatory approaches, engaging local communities and stakeholders, including SHGs, CBOs, and PRIs, to ensure ownership and sustainability.
- Focus on addressing specific community needs by fostering "farmer-to-farmer" learning and promoting self-reliance.

* Holistic Skill Development:

- Vocational and skill training programs for women, youth, and marginalized groups in areas such as tailoring, computer applications, mobile repairing, and electrician work.
- Leveraging non-formal education to empower individuals with basic literacy, practical skills, and personality development.

Example 2 Livelihood and Economic Empowerment:

- Implementation of the Skill Development Program in a cluster approach, enhancing livelihoods through enterprises, marketing, and value chain interventions by Women Self-Help Groups (SHGs).
- Support for agriculture, horticulture, and integrated farming systems to boost food security and increase income for rural communities.

Integrated Stakeholder Collaboration:

- Collaboration with government agencies, local authorities, technical institutions, and corporate bodies to align efforts and leverage resources for community development.
- Support from various schemes, including poverty alleviation, social enterprises, and financial literacy programs, ensuring broader socio-economic impact.

Career Counselling and Placement:

- Active career counselling and job placement initiatives for trained individuals, connecting them with local industries and businesses, facilitating smooth transitions into the workforce.
- Efforts to link skilled trainees with employment opportunities both within and outside the state, creating pathways for long-term career growth.

Financial Inclusion and Awareness:

- Financial literacy programs targeting SHGs and youth, promoting sustainable income generation practices, and helping beneficiaries understand banking, financial transactions, and government schemes.
- Through these strategies, ISRD aims to create lasting change, improve livelihoods, and enhance the social and economic well-being of vulnerable populations in Ganjam, Gajapati, and Nabarangpur districts.

Climate Change Program

Youth for Water Plus - National Youth Day Celebration:

- On January 12, 2024, ISRD organized a thematic program titled Youth for Water Plus in celebration of National Youth Day. The event was celebrated across three districts, bringing together participants from various communities.
- The event focused on engaging youth in water conservation and sustainable practices, aligning with the objectives of National Youth Day to inspire and empower

young individuals for societal development. Activities included interactive sessions, motivational speeches by esteemed guests, and awareness campaigns to encourage proactive youth participation in water resource management and environmental sustainability.

Participants included district officials, Nehru Yuva Kendra (NYK) staff, students, and ISRD staff, fostering a collective spirit of commitment to the cause. By emphasizing the importance of youth-led initiatives, the program successfully underscored the need for sustainable practices and community-driven solutions for water conservation.

Climate Change Awareness and Disaster Prevention:

- Conduct awareness campaigns in Ganjam and Gajapati, focusing on the risks of landslides and cyclones once in a month in every village.
- Use community meetings, local media, and awareness materials to educate residents about prevention methods.

Strengthening Village-Level Disaster Preparedness:


- Empower and follow up local disaster preparedness groups in vulnerable areas.
- Train these groups to respond effectively during landslides, cyclones, and other emergencies, ensuring quick and safe actions.

Early Warning Systems:

- Collaborate with District Disaster preparedness functionaries and local authorities to enhance early warning systems for cyclones and landslides.
- Ensure timely alerts through mobile messages, community radio, and other accessible communication channels with cooperate with Dist. Govt. Departments.

Promoting Alternative Livelihoods:

- Support communities in disaster-prone areas by linking them with government programs for alternative livelihoods.
- Provide training and resources to help individuals develop sustainable income sources, reducing their vulnerability to climate impacts.



Forest Management & Biodiversity Conservation:

The ISRD also works on land rights of tribal population of Sorada block Ganjam. We coordinate with the local administration to ensure issue of homestead land patta & cultivable land patta to the tribal people. Sensitization programs organized on tribal people right to water, forest & land &community-based management of biodiversity. As they cannot depend on forest products throughout the year so at regular intervals forest living tribal people are imparted skill training on alternative livelihood options like rice puff unit, poultry, kitchen garden, medicinal garden, goatery etc.

Forest Management & Biodiversity Conservation:

ISRD works to support the land rights of the tribal population in Sorada block, Ganjam. In collaboration with local administration, we facilitate the issuance of homestead land pattas and cultivable land pattas for tribal communities. We also organize sensitization programs to educate tribal people about their rights to water, forest, and land, and promote community-based management of biodiversity.

Since forest products cannot sustain tribal communities year-round, ISRD regularly imparts skill training on alternative livelihood options. These include setting up rice puff units, poultry farming, kitchen and medicinal gardening, and goat farming, helping forest-dependent communities diversify their sources of income and improve their livelihoods.

Capacity building Training to Staff Organized by ISRD:

We organized a three-day capacity-building training program for the functionaries of the One Stop Centre and Shakti Sadan in Gajapati from 22nd to 24th November 2024. Staff members from three districts participated in the program. This initiative aimed to enhance their understanding of





various departmental schemes and foster stronger convergence among key stakeholders to improve services for women and children in need of protection and rehabilitation.

The program featured active participation from prominent attendees, including Sri Sudhir

Sabat (Director, ISRD), Sri Timan Bara (DPM, OLM), Smt. Manasmita Patro (District Programme Assistant), Smt. Sibani Panigrahi (Chief Resource Person, DCC – GTM, PCI, OLM), Sri Dillip Kumar Tanti (Senior Faculty and Course Coordinator, Union RSETI, Gajapati), Sri Susanta Ranjan Das (Deputy Director, Horticulture), Sri Arun Kumar Tripathy (DCPO, Gajapati), Sri Subala Kumar Jenamani (Deputy CO, ORMAS), and Sri Nageswar Choudhury (Deputy Director, ISRD).

This collaborative effort reaffirms our commitment to building a robust support system and promoting the holistic development and empowerment of vulnerable women and children in the region.

Strengthening of Local Self Governance

➤ ISRD has conducted 355 training sessions for PRI and urban representatives on their roles, responsibilities, and accountability, with the support of the Government of Odisha, in FY 2023-24. Since 2009, ISRD has been committed to promoting local economic development, social justice, and infrastructure development. The functions of local governments include building essential infrastructure like transport, roads, power lines, schools, and hospitals, while also ensuring the safety and security of

- workers, especially in sectors with heightened exposure to risks such as healthcare. Health workers are at risk of infection and other hazards, including long working hours, psychological distress, fatigue, burnout, stigma, and physical and psychological violence. This document underscores the rights and responsibilities of health workers, along with the measures necessary to safeguard their occupational safety and health.
- ➤ ISRD typically conducts this training exercise twice or thrice a year in various zones and areas across the undivided Ganjam District, now divided into Ganjam and Gajapati districts. In collaboration with the local self-government (LSG) administration, ISRD has launched initiatives aimed at sensitizing and orienting operational communities on the growing demand for skills that are essential for sustainable livelihoods and income generation. These initiatives focus on helping individuals acquire skills that can be sustained as permanent occupations for improving living standards.
- ➤ The ongoing effort serves as a best practice for tracking and mobilizing target groups to develop skills for utilizing the abundant natural resources in a sustainable manner. The goal is to balance the supply-demand dynamics in local markets by facilitating the flow of skilled human resources, ensuring accountability, and delivering services that fulfill everyday needs. This approach not only addresses the demand for skilled labor but also provides economic benefits through market-based opportunities.


